A YEAR IN REVIEW

Mortgage Payoffs

Two Habitat homeowners successfully paid off their mortgages, achieving financial independence and stability. We were so honored to help them quietly celebrate each of their milestones.

LEGISLATIVE ADVOCACY

We collaborated with affiliates across the state to advocate for funding earmarked for Habitat through a Pilot Program under the Department of Community Affairs. \$25 million has been allocated to NJ Habitats from the NJ Housing Trust Fund.

CONSTRUCTION

We celebrated the completion of a modular home and marked the groundbreaking for our affiliate's first accessible home, championing inclusivity in housing.

DECONSTRUCTION

Our commitment to environmental stewardship is evident through our sustainable practice of deconstructing homes during demolition season. This fall, we expanded our project capacity threefold, further demonstrating our dedication to these principles.



Ramp It Up

In February, Habitat proudly inaugurated the Ramp It Up Program, marking the installation of our first temporary ramp. This initiative aims to assist residents facing temporary disabilities, providing crucial support for maintaining access to their homes.

ReStore exceeds 1 Million in Gross Sales Revenue:

The fiscal year ending in June 2023 marked a significant achievement for ReStore sales, reaching just over \$1 million.

This milestone reflects the community's continued support and engagement with Habitat's mission.





 $oldsymbol{\mathsf{A}}$ ll too often we receive phone calls from distressed individuals or service providers hoping Habitat Cape May might be the answer to their housing crisis. The stories all echo what we hear across our nation – there simply is not enough affordable housing stock. Our pleas for support and financial contributions center around those stories of people who grew up here, went to school here, and now work here that are being forced out of rentals with nowhere to go. We know our market is a tourism economy and we wonder and worry how those very businesses that require this dwindling workforce will be able to operate. So what do we do about it?

Explore ways to build faster and join forces to shout louder. By speaking in one voice, we seek to influence statewide policies. legislative outcomes, and regulatory decisions, thereby addressing the critical issue of affordable housing for families in need. The collective advocacy efforts of all 17 NJ affiliates has multiplied exponentially within this last year. These voices of change are rising above the din as we unite with other housing organizations throughout the Garden State. This collective effort is designed to amplify our impact, advocating for policies and regulations that enhance housing development opportunities for families across the state.

Our activities include thorough research, letter writing, direct contact with elected officials, and active participation in public forums (including testifying before congress) or subject matter meetings.

Habitat Cape May is dedicated to making a meaningful impact on the affordable housing landscape in New Jersey. By fostering collaboration, sharing expertise, and speaking with one powerful voice, we aim to create positive change in legislation, policies, and regulations. Together, as a collective force, fighting to create systems-level change. We can build not only homes but also hope for families in need throughout the state of New Jersey.

Community Wealth Preservation Program

This measure expands access for certain buyers to acquire foreclosed properties at sheriff sales, aiming to enable foreclosed families and non-profit developers to retain homes before for-profit entities. Despite a conditional veto in 2022, it was signed into law during the 2023 lame duck session. NJ Habitats collectively endorsed the measure through a support letter to key officials.

S1446 A2785

American Dream Act

Originally allocating \$25 million for down payment and home repair assistance to low and moderate-income first-time homebuyers, the bill was incorporated into the 2023 budget, extending support to first-generation homebuyers. NJ affiliates were alerted to contact state legislators and the Governor, advocating for the measure's inclusion during budget negotiations.

\$25 Million Grant Program to NJ Habitats

Initially proposed under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, this bill aimed to allocate \$49 million for housing development. It was converted into budget language, securing a \$25 million carve-out exclusively for NJ Habitats in the 2023 state budget. Frequent meetings with DCA were held to promote flexibility in fund allocation and streamline processes.

Fair Appraisal Act

Despite not advancing through the legislative process, Governor Murphy has promised however to fulfill the intent of the legislation through the state's Fair Housing Act and NJ Division on Civil Rights. Calls to committee chairs urging support for the legislation. Habitats will continue to support fair housing appraisals through both state and federal legislative advocacy.

Fair Housing Act Reform

Introduced in December 2023, this measure seeks to codify elements of the State's Fair Housing Act, including reforms to municipal responsibilities and transparency in affordable housing provision. NJ affiliates advocated for its support, with ongoing efforts including testimony by Habitat EDs and op-eds submitted to prominent publications.



2023 State of Home Affordability in New Jersey




In New Jersey,

Wage needed to afford fair market rent for a twobedroom home in New Jersey, working 40 hours per week.


Minimum wage: \$14.13/hour


